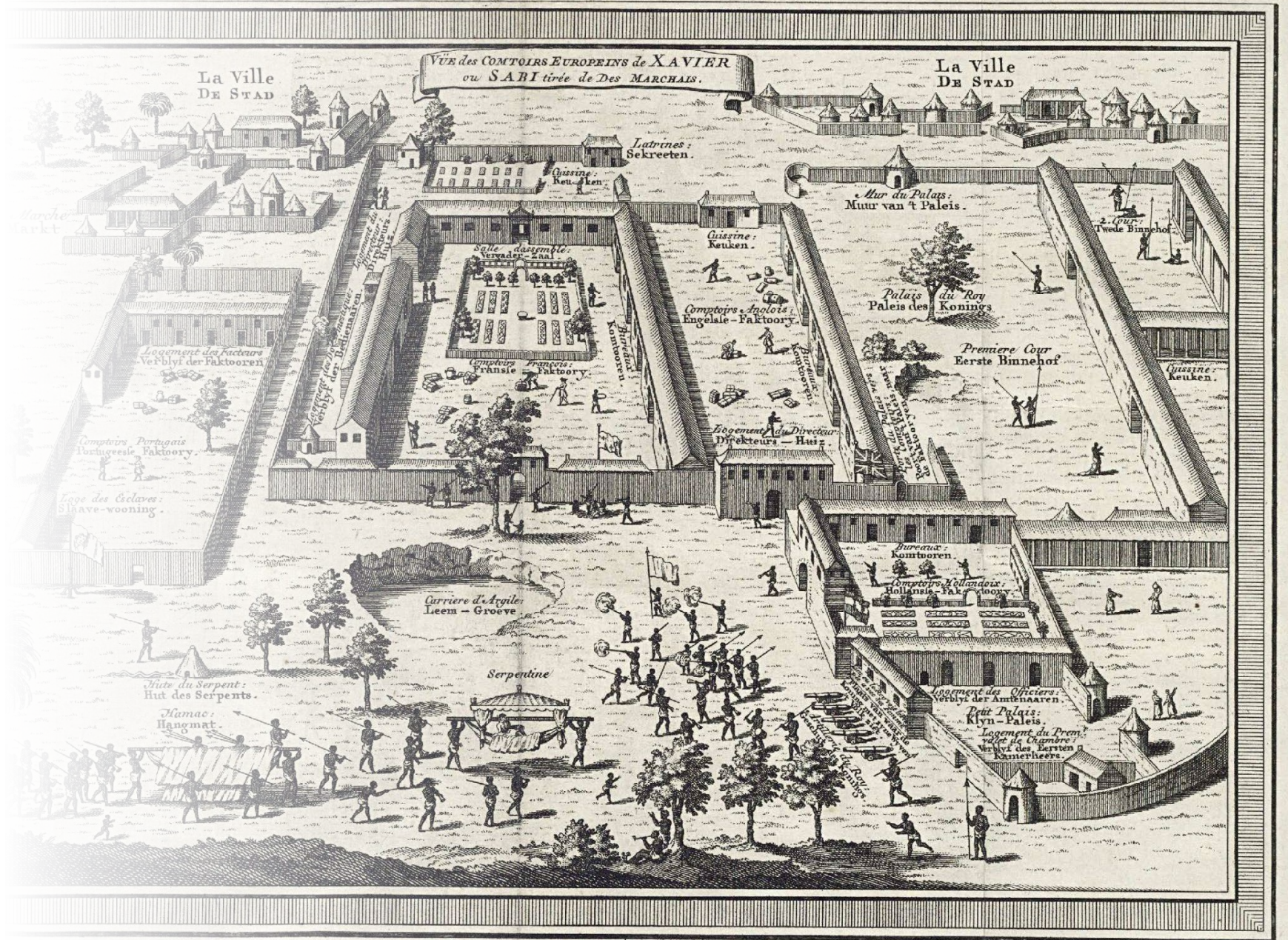

- VI. Unique features: Amazons, artwork, Vodun, music



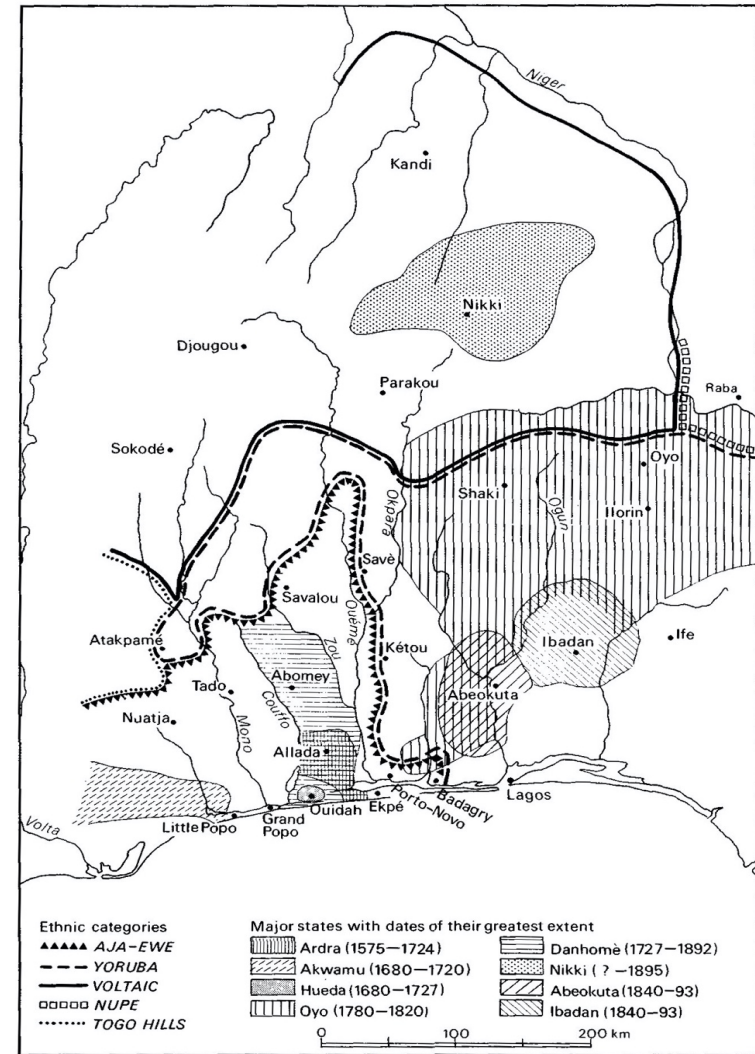

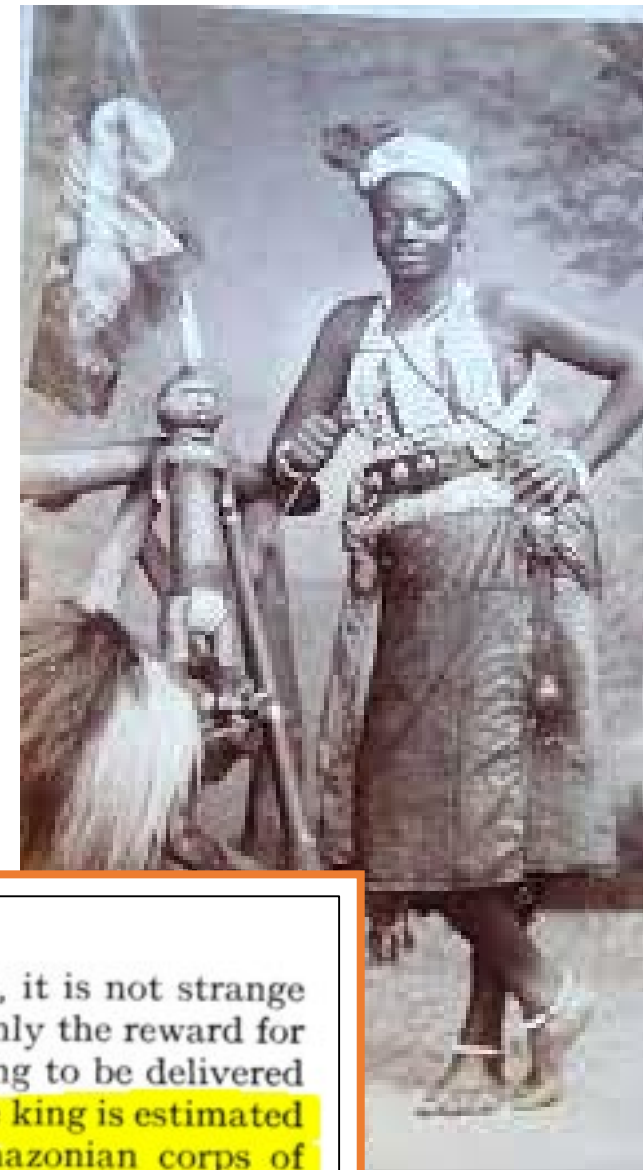
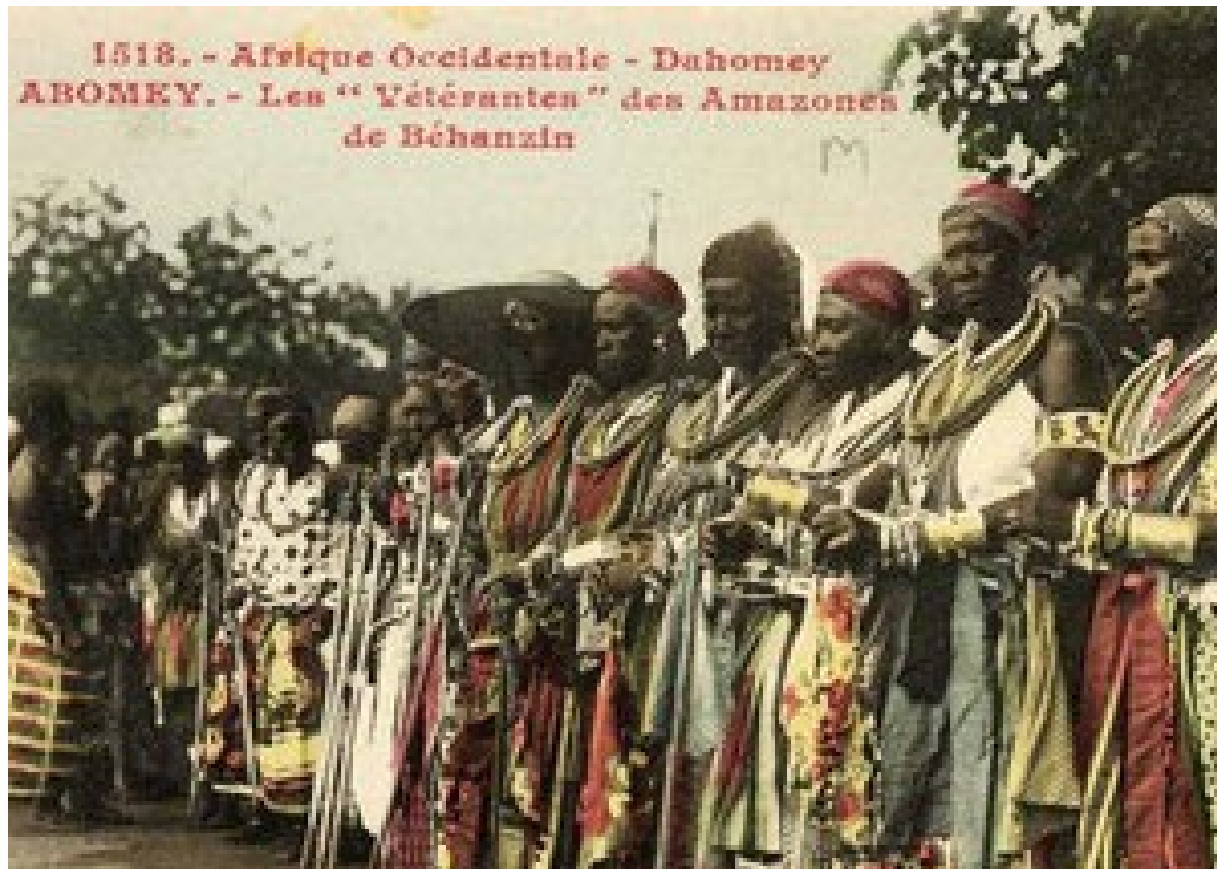
Political Organization of the Kingdom: The Cabinet

- The *Dada* or King
- The *Gbonougan* or Ministers
 - Migon/Migannon, Prime Minister and Minister of Justice
 - Akplogan, Minister of Cults who was based in Allada
 - Mèhou/Mèhounon, Second Prime Minister, preceptor of the princes/princesses
 - Yovogan, Minister of Foreign Affairs who was based in Ouidah
 - Adjaho, Minister in Charge of Security
 - Binazon, Minister of Finances
 - Tokpo, Minister of Agriculture



Political Organization of the Kingdom: The Military

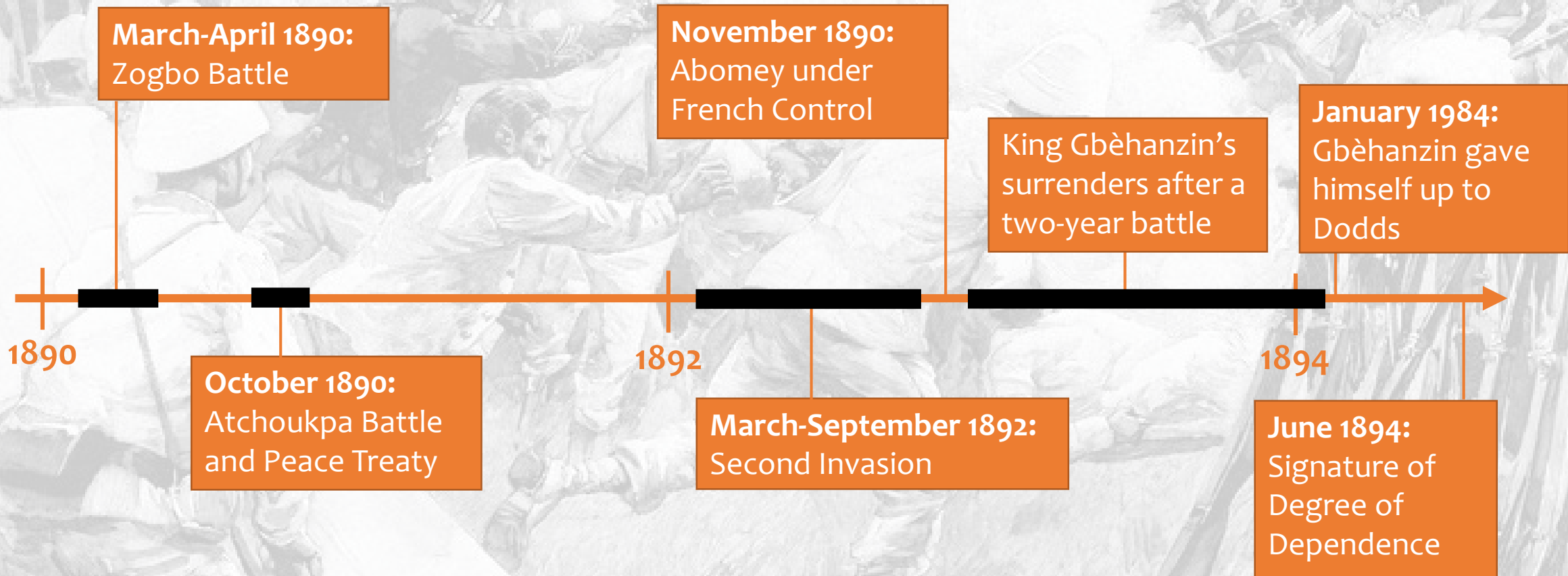
- Officially instituted by King Guezo and led by a Commander in Chief aka *Gahou*
- Composed of both men and women (Agoodjié aka Amazones)
- King Guézo also reorganized and officially instituted the women's army
- **Main battles:**
 - Guézo vs the Manhi (1828-1829): Victorious
 - First attack of Atakpamè (1840): The whole would have been defeated if it wasn't for the Amazones
 - Second attack of Atakpamè (1849): Victorious because of the Amazones
 - Defeated in Abeokuta in 1851



Von Frantzius wrote alike in 1888:

As these all [the king and noblemen] want gains, it is not strange to hear that to the worker from his six days' wages only the reward for four days remains, for one third of it is without saying to be delivered to his nearest chief [. . .]. The standing army of the king is estimated at several thousand soldiers; besides he has an amazonian corps of about 5 000 women . . .⁴

The correspondence started only in 1882 when the following letter, written in English and signed by Bismarck¹, was sent to Abomey:

Foreign Office of the German Empire, Berlin

January 16th 1882.

To His Majesty Gelele, King of Dahomey, Abomey

Your Majesty!

The German firm C. Goedelt, being desirous to extend its (already considerable) *existing* commerce with other countries of Western Africa to the Kingdom of Dahomey, has bought, subject to the consent of Your Majesty, the factory at Whydah which has hitherto belonged to the English firm F. A. Swanzy & Co. Hoping that Your Majesty may behold with favor this first effort to open direct intercourse between Germany and Dahomey, (which can not fail to contribute to the welfare of Your people and) to the benefit(s) of (which will be shared by) both countries, I (take leave) *beg* to recommend to Your Majesty's good will Mr. Adolph Elliot, who is bearer of this letter into Whydah, where he is to act as Agent of the said German firm. He is a highly respectable *German* merchant. (and a subject of William the First, German Emperor and King of Prussia) I (beg and) trust that Your Majesty will bestow upon him and other Germans, who may come by themselves or with

The above said agent of the Goedelt firm A. Elliot evidently was not a very suitable person for the delicate task of being the pioneer German merchant in the region. He behaved tactlessly with respect to the religious 'customs' in Whydah, and the Yovogan and the chiefs of the city complained in Abomey.² Nevertheless, the head of the said German firm, C. Goedelt, stressed in his letter³ to Count Hatzfeld, German Minister of State, that the incident with his agent did not affect the general friendly relations of the Dahomeyan Court towards Germany and that an expedition should be sent to Abomey to make a treaty between the two States.⁴ This nevertheless did not happen, as it seems, because of financial and time reasons. The German authorities were afraid of the strange custom of the Dahomeyan King, to keep European visitors for several months at his Court,⁵ of course mostly at their expenses.

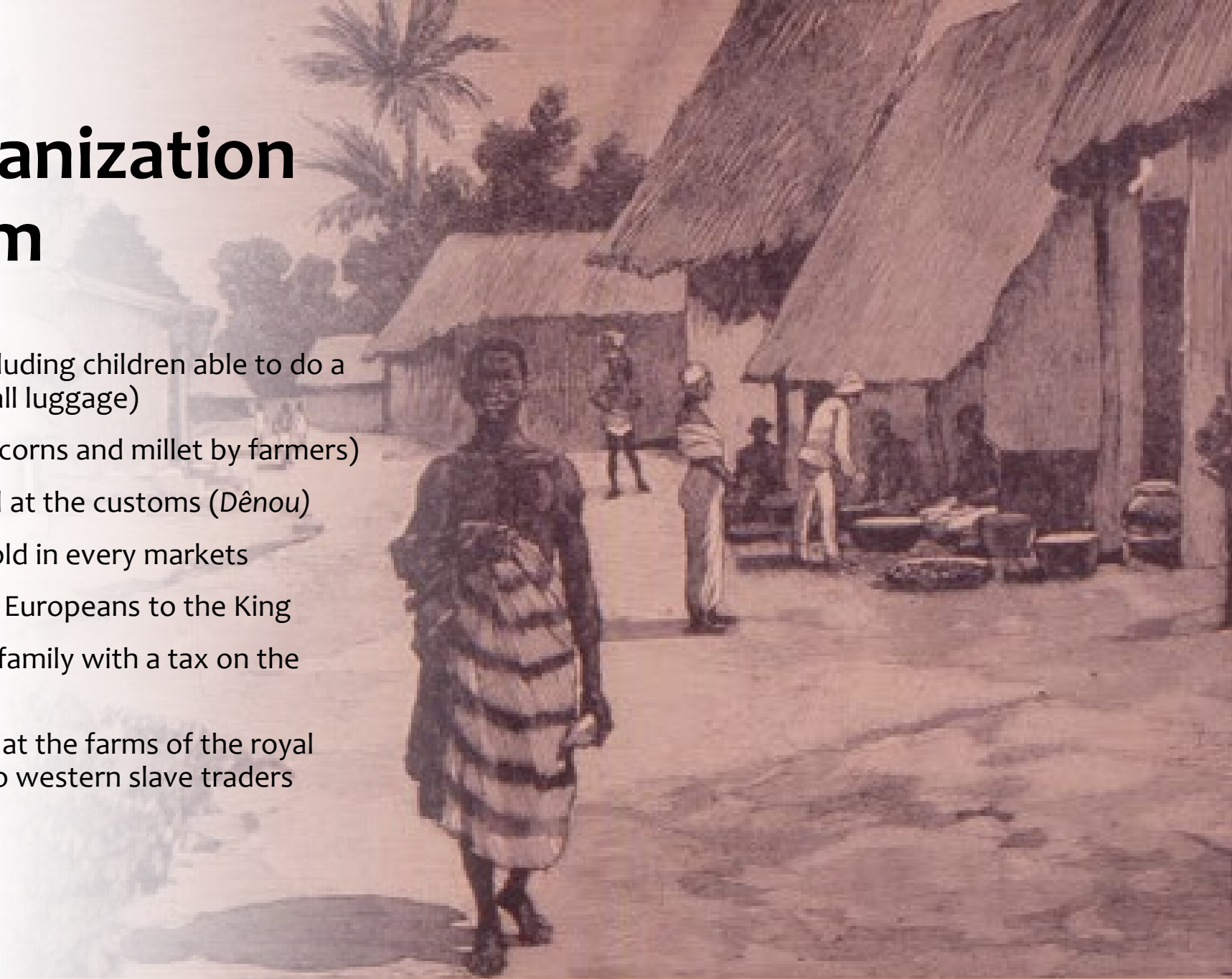

Economic Organization of the Kingdom

- *Amlonkouè* (paid by everyone including children able to do a one-day journey on foot with small luggage)
- *Kouzou* (collected on palm trees, corns and millet by farmers)
- Tariffs (*Dé gbigba kouè'*) collected at the customs (*Dênou*)
- Taxes imposed on goods being sold in every markets
- 50% discount on all goods sold by Europeans to the King
- Hunters had to provide the royal family with a tax on the proceeds from hunting
- *Kannoumonnon* or slaves worked at the farms of the royal family and were also being sold to western slave traders

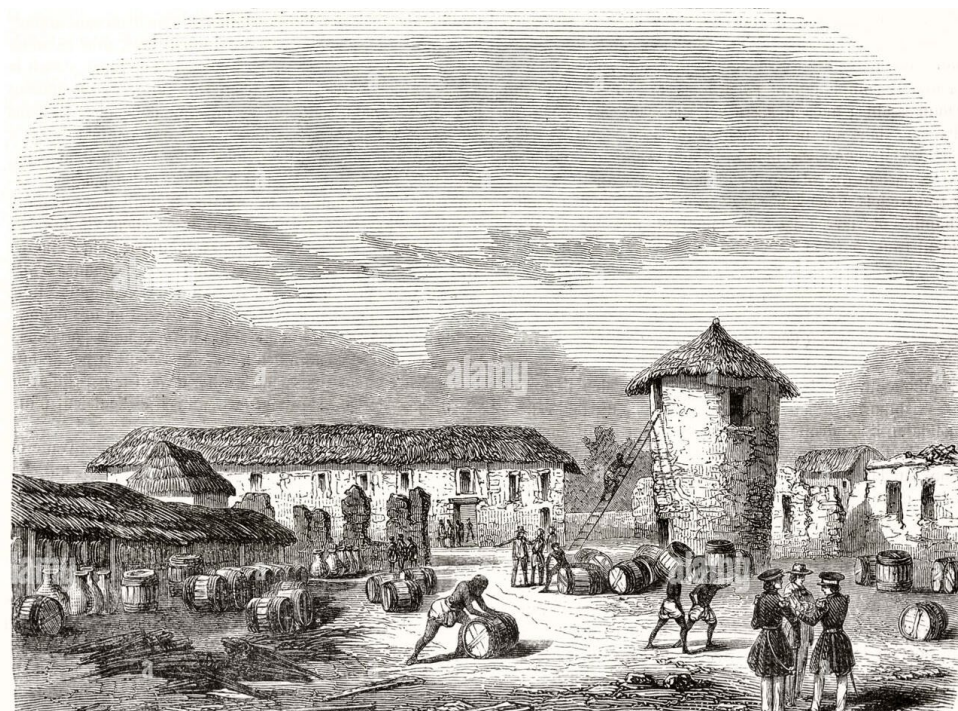

Chicago Singer Weds Prince Houenou of Dahomey in Paris

Paris, Oct. 6 (UP).—Roberta Dodd Crawford, a singer from Chicago, and Prince Kojo Touvalou Houenou of Dahomey, whose ancestors once commanded the finest Amazonian army in the world, were married here today.

The Prince and his bride will leave on the next ship for Dahomey, French West Africa, where the religious ceremony will be held at Ouidah Cathedral. The Prince, who has studied law and medicine in France and served in the medical corps during the World War, is related to former King Behanzin of Dahomey.
